18\_JOB\_09\_01 Then Job answered and said,

18\_JOB\_09\_02 I know [it is] so of a truth: but how should man be just with God?

18\_JOB\_09\_03 If he will contend with him, he cannot answer him one of a thousand.

 $18\_JOB\_09\_04~[He~is]~wise~in~heart,~and~mighty~in~strength:~who~hath~hardened~[himself]~against~him,~and~hath~prospered?$ 

18\_JOB\_09\_05 Which removeth the mountains, and they know not: which overturneth them in his anger.

18\_JOB\_09\_06 Which shaketh the earth out of her place, and the pillars thereof tremble.

18\_JOB\_09\_07 Which commandeth the sun, and it riseth not; and sealeth up the stars.

18\_JOB\_09\_08 Which alone spreadeth out the heavens, and treadeth upon the waves of the sea.

18\_JOB\_09\_09 Which maketh Arcturus, Orion, and Pleiades, and the chambers of the south.

18\_JOB\_09\_10 Which doeth great things past finding out; yea, and wonders without number.

18\_JOB\_09\_11 Lo, he goeth by me, and I see [him] not: he passeth on also, but I perceive him not.

18\_JOB\_09\_12 Behold, he taketh away, who can hinder him? who will say unto him, What doest thou?

18\_JOB\_09\_13 [If] God will not withdraw his anger, the proud helpers do stoop under him.

18\_JOB\_09\_14 How much less shall I answer him, [and] choose out my words [to reason] with him?

18\_JOB\_09\_15 Whom, though I were righteous, [yet] would I not answer, [but] I would make supplication to my judge.

18 JOB 09 16 If I had called, and he had answered me; [yet] would I not believe that he had hearkened unto my voice.

18\_JOB\_09\_17 For he breaketh me with a tempest, and multiplieth my wounds without cause.

 $18\_JOB\_09\_18$  He will not suffer me to take my breath, but filleth me with bitterness.

18\_JOB\_09\_19 If [I speak] of strength, lo, [he is] strong: and if of judgment, who shall set me a time [to plead]?

18\_JOB\_09\_20 If I justify myself, mine own mouth shall condemn me: [if I say], I [am] perfect, it shall also prove me perverse.

18\_JOB\_09\_21 [Though] I [were] perfect, [yet] would I not know my soul: I would despise my life.

18\_JOB\_09\_22 This [is] one [thing], therefore I said [it], He destroyeth the perfect and the wicked.

18\_JOB\_09\_23 If the scourge slay suddenly, he will laugh at the trial of the innocent.

18\_JOB\_09\_24 The earth is given into the hand of the wicked: he covereth the faces of the judges thereof; if not, where, [and] who [is] he?

 $18\_JOB\_09\_25$  Now my days are swifter than a post: they flee away, they see no good.

18\_JOB\_09\_26 They are passed away as the swift ships: as the eagle [that] hasteth to the prey.

18\_JOB\_09\_27 If I say, I will forget my complaint, I will leave off my heaviness, and comfort [myself]:

 $18\_JOB\_09\_28~I$  am afraid of all my sorrows, I know that thou wilt not hold me innocent.

18\_JOB\_09\_29 [If] I be wicked, why then labour I in vain?

18\_JOB\_09\_30 If I wash myself with snow water, and make my hands never so clean;

18\_JOB\_09\_31 Yet shalt thou plunge me in the ditch, and mine own clothes shall abhor me.

 $18\_JOB\_09\_32 \ For \ [he\ is]\ not\ a\ man,\ as\ I\ [am,\ that]\ I\ should\ answer\ him,\ [and]\ we\ should\ come\ together\ in\ judgment.$ 

18\_JOB\_09\_33 Neither is there any daysman betwixt us, [that] might lay his hand upon us both.

18\_JOB\_09\_34 Let him take his rod away from me, and let not his fear terrify me:

18\_JOB\_09\_35 [Then] would I speak, and not fear him; but [it is] not so with me.
