

vagabond 5110 ## nuwd {nood}; a primitive root; to nod, i.e. waver; figuratively, to wander, flee, disappear; also (from shaking the head in sympathy), to console, deplore, or (from tossing the head in scorn) taunt: -- bemoan, flee, get, mourn, make to move, take pity, remove, shake, skip for joy, be sorry, {vagabond}, way, wandering.

vagabond 5128 ## nuwa< {noo'-ah}; a primitive root; to waver, in a great variety of applications, literally and figuratively (as subjoined): -- continually, fugitive, X make, to [go] up and down, be gone away, (be) move(-able, -d), be promoted, reel, remove, scatter, set, shake, sift, stagger, to and fro, be {vagabond}, wag, (make) wander (up and down).

vagabond 4022 # perierchomai {per-ee-er'-khom-ahee}; from 4012 and 2064 (including its alternate); to come all around, i.e. stroll, vacillate, veer: -- fetch a compass, {vagabond}, wandering about.

vail 4304 ## mitpachath {mit-pakh'-ath}; from 2946; a wide cloak (for a woman): -- {vail}, wimple.

vail 4533 ## macveh {mas-veh'}; apparently from an unused root meaning to cover; a veil: -- {vail}.

vail 4541 ## maccekah {mas-say-kaw'}; from 5258; properly, a pouring over, i.e. fusion of metal (especially a cast image); by implication, a libation, i.e. league; concretely a coverlet (as if poured out): -- covering, molten (image), {vail}.

vail 6532 ## poreketh {po-reh'-keth}; feminine active participle of the same as 6531; a separatrix, i.e. (the sacred) screen: -- {vail}.

vail 6809 ## tsa<iyph {tsaw-eef'}; from an unused root meaning to wrap over; a veil: -- {vail}.

vail 7289 ## radiyd {raw-deed'}; from 7286 in the sense of spreading; a veil (as expanded): -- {vail}, veil.

vail 2571 # kaluma {kal'-oo-mah}; from 2572; a cover, i.e. veil: -- {vail}.

vail 2665 # katapetasma {kat-ap-et'-as-mah}; from a compound of 2596 and a congener of 4072; something spread thoroughly, i.e. (specially) the door screen (to the Most Holy Place) in the Jewish Temple: -- {vail}.

vain 0205 ## >aven {aw-ven'}; from an unused root perhaps meaning properly, to pant (hence, to exert oneself, usually in vain; to come to naught); strictly nothingness; also trouble. vanity, wickedness; specifically an idol: -- affliction, evil, false, idol, iniquity, mischief, mourners(-ing), naught, sorrow, unjust, unrighteous, {vain}, vanity, wicked(-ness). Compare 369.

vain 1891 ## habal {haw-bal'}; a primitive root; to be vain in act, word, or expectation; specifically to lead astray: -- be (become, make) {vain}.

vain 1892 ## hebel {heh'bel}; or (rarely in the abs.) habel {hab-ale'}; from 1891; emptiness or vanity; figuratively, something transitory and unsatisfactory; often used as an adverb: -- X altogether, {vain}, vanity.

vain 2600 ## chinnam {khin-nawm'}; from 2580; gratis, i.e. devoid of cost, reason or advantage: -- without a cause (cost, wages), causeless, to cost nothing, free(-ly), innocent, for nothing (nought, in {vain}).

vain 3576 ## kazab {kaw-zab'}; a primitive root; to lie (i.e. deceive), literally or figuratively: -- fail, (be found a, make a) liar, lie, lying, be in {vain}.

vain 5014 ## nabab {naw-bab'}; a primitive root; to pierce; to be hollow, or (figuratively) foolish: -- hollow, {vain}.

vain 6754 ## tselem {tseh'-lem}; from an unused root meaning to shade; a phantom, i.e. (figuratively) illusion, resemblance; hence, a representative figure, especially an idol: -- image, {vain} shew.

vain 7307 ## ruwach {roo'-akh}; from 7306; wind; by resemblance breath, i.e. a sensible (or even violent) exhalation; figuratively, life, anger, unsubstantiality; by extension, a region of the sky; by resemblance spirit, but only of a rational being (including its expression and functions): -- air, anger, blast, breath, X cool, courage, mind, X quarter, X side, spirit([-ual]), tempest, X {vain}, ([whirl-])wind(-y).

vain 7385 ## riyq {reek}; from 7324; emptiness; figuratively, a worthless thing; adverbially, in vain: -- empty, to no purpose, (in) {vain} (thing), vanity.

vain 7386 ## reyq {rake}; or (shorter) req {rake}; from 7324; empty; figuratively, worthless: -- emptied(-ty), {vain} (fellow, man).

vain 7387 ## reyqam {ray-kawm'}; from 7386; emptily; figuratively (objective) ineffectually, (subjective) undeservedly: -- without cause, empty, in {vain}, void.

vain 7723 ## shav> {shawv}; or shav {shav}; from the same as 7722 in the sense of desolating; evil (as destructive), literally (ruin) or morally (especially guile); figuratively idolatry (as false, subjective), uselessness (as deceptive, objective; also adverbially, in vain): -- false(-ly), lie, lying, {vain}, vanity.

vain 8193 ## saphah {saw-faw'}; or (in dual and plural) sepheth {sef-eth'}; probably from 5595 or 8192 through the idea of termination (compare 5490); the lip (as a natural boundary); by implication, language; by analogy, a margin (of a vessel, water, cloth, etc.): -- band, bank, binding, border, brim, brink, edge, language, lip, prating, ([sea-])shore, side, speech, talk, [{vain}] words.

vain 8267 ## sheqer {sheh'-ker}; from 8266; an untruth; by implication, a sham (often adverbial): -- without a cause, deceit(-ful), false(-hood, -ly), feignedly, liar, + lie, lying, {vain} (thing), wrongfully.

vain 8414 ## tohuw {to'-hoo}; from an unused root meaning to lie waste; a desolation (of surface), i.e. desert; figuratively, a worthless thing; adverbially, in vain: -- confusion, empty place, without form, nothing, (thing of) nought, {vain}, vanity, waste, wilderness.

vain 0945 # battologeo {bat-tol-og-eh'-o}; from Battos (a proverbial stammerer) and 3056; to stutter, i.e. (by implication) to prate tediously: -- use {vain} repetitions.

vain 1432 # dorean {do-reh-an'}; accusative case of 1431 as adverb; gratuitously (literally or figuratively): -- without a cause, freely, for naught, in {vain}.

vain 1500 # eike {i-kay'}; probably from 1502 (through the idea of failure); idly, i.e. without reason (or effect): -- without a cause, (in) {vain}(-ly).

vain 2756 # kenos {ken-os'}; apparently a primary word; empty (literally or figuratively): -- empty, (in) {vain}.

vain 2757 # kenophonia {ken-of-o-nee'-ah}; from a presumed compound of 2756 and 5456; empty sounding, i.e. fruitless discussion: -- {vain}.

vain 2758 # kenoo {ken-o'-o}; from 2756; to make empty, i.e. (figuratively) to abase, neutralize, falsify: -- make (of none effect, of no reputation, void), be in {vain}.

vain 2761 # kenos {ken-oc'e'}; adverb from 2756; vainly, i.e. to no purpose: -- in {vain}.

vain 3150 # mataiologia {mat-ah-yol-og-ee'-ah}; from 3151; random talk, i.e. babble: -- {vain} jangling.

vain 3151 # mataiologos {mat-ah-yol-og'-os}; from 3152 and 3004; an idle (i.e. senseless or mischievous) talker, i.e. a wrangler: -- {vain} talker.

vain 3152 # mataios {mat'-ah-yos}; from the base of 3155; empty, i.e. (literally) profitless, or (specifically) an idol: -- {vain}, vanity.

vain 3154 # mataioo {mat-ah-yo'-o}; from 3152; to render (passively, become) foolish, i.e. (morally) wicked or (specifically) idolatrous: -- become {vain}.

vain 3155 # maten {mat'-ane}; accus. of a derivative of the base of 3145 (through the idea of tentative manipulation, i.e. unsuccessful search, or else of punishment); folly, i.e. (adverbially) to no purpose: -- in {vain}.

vain-glory 2754 # kenodoxia {ken-od-ox-ee'-ah}; from 2755; empty glorying, i.e. self-conceit: -- {vain-glory}.

vain-glory 2755 # kenodoxos {ken-od' -ox-os}; from 2756 and 1391; vainly glorifying, i.e. self-conceited: -- desirous of {vain-glory}.

Vajezatha 2055 ## Vay@zatha> {vah-yez-aw' -thaw}; of foreign origin; Vajezatha, a son of Haman: -- {Vajezatha}.

vale 6010 ## <emeq {ay' -mek}; from 6009; a vale (i.e. broad depression): -- dale, {vale}, valley [often used as a part of proper names]. See also 1025.

vale 8219 ## sh@phelah {shef-ay-law' }; from 8213; Lowland, i.e. (with the article) the maritime slope of Palestine: -- low country, (low) plain, {vale}(-ley).

valiant 0047 ## >abbiyr {ab-beer' }; for 46; -- angel, bull, chiefest, mighty (one), stout[-hearted], strong (one), {valiant}.

valiant 0381 ## >lysh-Chayil {eesh-khah' -yil}; from 376 and 2428; man of might; by defect. transcription (2 Sam. 23:20) >lysh-Chay {eesh-khah' ee}; as if from 376 and 2416; living man; Ish-chail (or Ish-chai), an Israelite: -- a {valiant} man.

valiant 0691 ## >er>el {er-ale' }; probably for 739; a hero (collectively): -- {valiant} one.

valiant 1121 ## ben {bane}; from 1129; a son (as a builder of the family name), in the widest sense (of literal and figurative relationship, including grandson, subject, nation, quality or condition, etc., [like 1, 251, etc.]): -- + afflicted, age, [Ahoh-] [Ammon-] [Hachmon-] [Lev-]ite, [anoint-]ed one, appointed to, (+) arrow, [Assyr-] [Babylon-] [Egypt-] [Grec-]ian, one born, bough, branch, breed, + (young) bullock, + (young) calf, X came up in, child, colt, X common, X corn, daughter, X of first, + firstborn, foal, + very fruitful, + postage, X in, + kid, + lamb, (+) man, meet, + mighty, + nephew, old, (+) people, + rebel, + robber, X servant born, X soldier, son, + spark, + steward, + stranger, X surely, them of, + tumultuous one, + {valiant}[-est], whelp, worthy, young (one), youth.

valiant 1368 ## gibbowr {ghib-bore' }; or (shortened) gibbor {ghib-bore' }; intensive from the same as 1397; powerful; by implication, warrior, tyrant: -- champion, chief, X excel, giant, man, mighty (man, one), strong (man), {valiant} man.

valiant 1396 ## gabar {gaw-bar' }; a primitive root; to be strong; by implication, to prevail, act insolently: -- exceed, confirm, be great, be mighty, prevail, put to more [strength], strengthen, be stronger, be {valiant}.

valiant 3524 ## kabbiyr {kab-beer' }; from 3527; vast, whether in extent (figuratively, of power, mighty; of time, aged), or in number, many: -- + feeble, mighty, most, much, strong, {valiant}.

valiant 2478 # ischuros {is-khoo-ros' }; from 2479; forcible (literally or figuratively): -- boisterous, mighty(-ier), powerful, strong(-er, man),

{valiant}.

valiantly 2388 ## chazaq {khaw-zak'}; a primitive root; to fasten upon; hence, to seize, be strong (figuratively, courageous, causatively strengthen, cure, help, repair, fortify), obstinate; to bind, restrain, conquer: -- aid, amend, X calker, catch, cleave, confirm, be constant, constrain, continue, be of good (take) courage(-ous, -- ly), encourage (self), be established, fasten, force, fortify, make hard, harden, help, (lay) hold (fast), lean, maintain, play the man, mend, become (wax) mighty, prevail, be recovered, repair, retain, seize, be (wax) sore, strengthen (self), be stout, be (make, shew, wax) strong(-er), be sure, take (hold), be urgent, behave self {valiantly}, withstand.

valley 1237 ## biq<ah {bik-aw'}; from 1234; properly, a split, i.e. a wide level valley between mountains: -- plain, {valley}.

valley 1516 ## gay> {gah'-ee}; or (shortened) gay {gah'-ee}; probably (by transmutation) from the same root as 1466 (abbreviated); a gorge (from its lofty sides; hence, narrow, but not a gully or winter-torrent): -- {valley}.

valley 5158 ## nachal {nakh'-al}; or (feminine) nachlah (Psalm 124:4) {nakh'-law}; or nachalah (Ezekiel 47:19; 48:28) {nakh-al-aw'}; from 5157 in its original sense; a stream, especially a winter torrent; (by implication) a (narrow) valley (in which a brook runs); also a shaft (of a mine): -- brook, flood, river, stream, {valley}.

valley 6010 ## <emeq {ay'-mek}; from 6009; a vale (i.e. broad depression): -- dale, vale, {valley} [often used as a part of proper names]. See also 1025.

valley 5327 # pharagx {far'-anx}; properly, strengthened from the base of 4008 or rather of 4486; a gap or chasm, i.e. ravine (winter-torrent): -- {valley}.

valour 2428 ## chayil {khah'-yil}; from 2342; probably a force, whether of men, means or other resources; an army, wealth, virtue, valor, strength: -- able, activity, (+) army, band of men (soldiers), company, (great) forces, goods, host, might, power, riches, strength, strong, substance, train, (+)valiant(-ly), {valour}, virtuous(-ly), war, worthy(-ily).

value 0457 ## >eliyl {el-eel'}; apparently from 408; good for nothing, by anal. vain or vanity; specifically an idol: -- idol, no {value}, thing of nought.

value 5541 ## calah {saw-law'}; a primitive root; to hang up, i.e. weigh, or (figuratively) contemn: -- tread down (under foot), {value}.

value 6186 ## <arak {aw-rak'}; a primitive root; to set in a row, i.e. arrange, put in order (in a very wide variety of applications): -- put (set) (the battle, self) in array, compare, direct, equal, esteem, estimate, expert [in war], furnish, handle, join [battle], ordain, (lay, put, reckon up, set) (in) order, prepare, tax, {value}.

value 1308 # diaphero {dee-af-er'-o}; from 1223 and 5342; to bear through,

i.e. (literally) transport; usually to bear apart, i.e. (objectively) to toss about (figuratively, report); subjectively, to "differ", or (by implication) surpass: -- be better, carry, differ from, drive up and down, be (more) excellent, make matter, publish, be of more {value}.

value 5091 # timao {tim-ah'-o}; from 5093; to prize, i.e. fix a valuation upon; by implication, to revere: -- honour, {value}.

valuest 6187 ## <erek {eh'rek}; from 6186; a pile, equipment, estimate: -- equal, estimation, (things that are set in) order, price, proportion, X set at, suit, taxation, X {valuest}.

Vaniah 2057 ## Vanyah {van-yaw'}; perhaps for 6043; Vanjah, an Israelite: -- {Vaniah}.

vanish 3212 ## yalak {yaw-lak'}; a primitive root [compare 1980]; to walk (literally or figuratively); causatively, to carry (in various senses): -- X again, away, bear, bring, carry (away), come (away), depart, flow, + follow(-ing), get (away, hence, him), (cause to, made) go (away, -- ing, -- ne, one's way, out), grow, lead (forth), let down, march, prosper, + pursue, cause to run, spread, take away ([-journey]), {vanish}, (cause to) walk(-ing), wax, X be weak.

vanish 4414 ## malach {maw-lakh'}; a primitive root; properly, to rub to pieces or pulverize; intransitively, to disappear as dust; also (as denominative from 4417) to salt whether internally (to season with salt) or externally (to rub with salt): -- X at all, salt, season, temper together, {vanish} away.

vanish 6789 ## tsamath {tsaw-math'}; a primitive root; to extirpate (literally or figuratively): -- consume, cut off, destroy, {vanish}.

vanish 0853 # aphanizo {af-an-id'-zo}; from 852; to render unapparent, i.e. (actively) consume (becloud), or (passively) disappear (be destroyed): -- corrupt, disfigure, perish, {vanish} away.

vanish 0854 # aphanismos {af-an-is-mos'}; from 853; disappearance, i.e. (figuratively) abrogation: -- {vanish} away.

vanish 2673 # katargeo {kat-arg-eh'-o}; from 2596 and 691; to be (render) entirely idle (useless), literally or figuratively: -- abolish, cease, cumber, deliver, destroy, do away, become (make) of no (none, without) effect, fail, loose, bring (come) to nought, put away (down), {vanish} away, make void.

vanished 0855 # aphantos {af'-an-tos}; from 1 (as a negative particle) and a derivative of 5316; non-manifested, i.e. invisible: -- {vanished} out of sight.

vanity 1892 ## hebel {heh'bel}; or (rarely in the abs.) habel {hab-ale'}; from 1891; emptiness or vanity; figuratively, something transitory and unsatisfactory; often used as an adverb: -- X altogether, vain, {vanity}.

vanity 7385 ## riyq {reek}; from 7324; emptiness; figuratively, a worthless thing; adverbially, in vain: -- empty, to no purpose, (in) vain (thing), {vanity}.

vanity 7723 ## shav> {shawv}; or shav {shav}; from the same as 7722 in the sense of desolating; evil (as destructive), literally (ruin) or morally (especially guile); figuratively idolatry (as false, subjective), uselessness (as deceptive, objective; also adverbially, in vain): -- false(-ly), lie, lying, vain, {vanity}.

vanity 8414 ## tohuw {to'-hoo}; from an unused root meaning to lie waste; a desolation (of surface), i.e. desert; figuratively, a worthless thing; adverbially, in vain: -- confusion, empty place, without form, nothing, (thing of) nought, vain, {vanity}, waste, wilderness.

vanity 3152 # mataios {mat'-ah-yos}; from the base of 3155; empty, i.e. (literally) profitless, or (specifically) an idol: -- vain, {vanity}.

vanity 3153 # mataiotes {mat-ah-yot'-ace}; from 3152; inutility; figuratively, transiency; morally, depravity: -- {vanity}.

vapor 0108 ## >ed {ade} from the same as 181 (in the sense of enveloping); a fog: -- mist, {vapor}.

vapour 5387 ## nasiy> {naw-see'}; or nasi> {naw-see'}; from 5375; properly, an exalted one, i.e. a king or sheik; also a rising mist: -- captain, chief, cloud, governor, prince, ruler, {vapour}.

vapour 7008 ## qiytowr {kee-tore'}; or qiytor {kee-tore'}; from 6999; a fume, i.e. cloud: -- smoke, {vapour}.

vapour 0822 # atmis {at-mece'}; from the same as 109; mist: -- {vapour}.

variableness 3883 # parallage {par-al-lag-ay'}; from a compound of 3844 and 236; transmutation (of phase or orbit), i.e. (figuratively) fickleness: -- {variableness}.

variance 1369 # dichazo {dee-khad'-zo}; from a derivative of 1364; to make apart, i.e. sunder (figuratively, alienate): -- set at {variance}.

variance 2054 # eris {er'-is}; of uncertain affinity; a quarrel, i.e. (by implication) wrangling: -- contention, debate, strife, {variance}.

variety 3844 # para {par-ah'}; a primary preposition; properly, near; i.e. (with genitive case) from beside (literally or figuratively), (with dative case) at (or in) the vicinity of (objectively or subjectively), (with accusative case) to the proximity with (local [especially beyond or opposed to] or causal [on account of]: -- above, against, among, at, before, by, contrary to, X friend, from, + give [such things as they], + that [she] had, X his, in, more than, nigh unto, (out) of, past, save, side...by, in the sight of, than, [there-]fore, with. In compounds it retains the same {variety} of application.

Vashni 2059 ## Vashniy {vash-nee'}; probably from 3461; weak; Vashni, an Israelite: -- {Vashni}.

Vashti 2060 ## Vashtiy {vash-tee'}; of Persian origin; Vashti, the queen of Xerxes: -- {Vashti}.

vaunt 6286 ## pa>ar {paw-ar'}; a primitive root; to gleam, i.e. (causatively) embellish; figuratively, to boast; also to explain (i.e. make clear) oneself; denominative from 6288, to shake a tree: -- beautify, boast self, go over the boughs, glorify (self), glory, {vaunt} self.

vaunt 4068 # perpereuomai {per-per-yoo'-om-ah-ee}; middle voice from perperos (braggart; perhaps by reduplication of the base of 4008); to boast: -- {vaunt} itself.

vehement 2759 ## chariyshiy {khar-ee-shee'}; from 2790 in the sense of silence; quiet, i.e. sultry (as feminine noun, the sirocco or hot east wind): -- {vehement}.

vehement 3050 ## Yahh {yaw}; contraction for 3068, and meaning the same; Jah, the sacred name: -- Jah, the Lord, most {vehement}. Compare names in "-iah," "-jah."

vehement 1972 # epi pothesis {ep-ee-poth'-ay-sis}; from 1971; a longing for: -- earnest ({vehement}) desire.

vehement 4053 # perissos {per-is-sos'}; from 4012 (in the sense of beyond); superabundant (in quantity) or superior (in quality); by implication, excessive; adverbially (with 1537) violently; neuter (as noun) preeminence: -- exceeding abundantly above, more abundantly, advantage, exceedingly, very highly, beyond measure, more, superfluous, {vehement}[-ly].

vehemently 1171 # deinos {di-noce'}; adverb from a derivative of the same as 1169; terribly, i.e. excessively: -- grievously, {vehemently}.

vehemently 1537 # ek {ek} or ex {ex}; a primary preposition denoting origin (the point whence action or motion proceeds), from, out (of place, time, or cause; literal or figurative; direct or remote): -- after, among, X are, at, betwixt(-yond), by (the means of), exceedingly, (+ abundantly above), for(-th), from (among, forth, up), + grudgingly, + heartily, X heavenly, X hereby, + very highly, in, ...ly, (because, by reason) of, off (from), on, out among (from, of), over, since, X thenceforth, through, X unto, X {vehemently}, with(-out). Often used in composition, with the same general import; often of completion.

vehemently 2159 # eutonos {yoo-ton'-oce}; adverb from a compound of 2095 and a derivative of teino (to stretch); in a well-strung manner, i.e. (figuratively) intensely (in a good sense, cogently; in a bad one, fiercely): -- mightily, {vehemently}.

vehemently 4366 # prosregnumi {pros-rayg'-noo-mee}; from 4314 and 4486; to tear towards, i.e. burst upon (as a tempest or flood): -- beat {vehemently} against (upon).



veil 7289 ## radiyd {raw-deed'}; from 7286 in the sense of spreading; a veil (as expanded): -- veil, {veil}.

vein 4161 ## mowtsa> {mo-tsaw'}; or motsa> {mo-tsaw'}; from 3318; a going forth, i.e. (the act) an egress, or (the place) an exit; hence, a source or product; specifically, dawn, the rising of the sun (the East), exportation, utterance, a gate, a fountain, a mine, a meadow (as producing grass): -- brought out, bud, that which came out, east, going forth, goings out, that which (thing that) is gone out, outgoing, proceeded out, spring, {vein}, [water-]course [springs].

vengeance 5358 ## naqam {naw-kam'}; a primitive root; to grudge, i.e. avenge or punish: -- avenge(-r, self), punish, revenge (self), X surely, take {vengeance}.

vengeance 5359 ## naqam {naw-kawm'}; from 5358; revenge: -- + avenged, quarrel, {vengeance}.

vengeance 5360 ## n@qamah {nek-aw-maw'}; feminine of 5359; avengement, whether the act of the passion: -- + avenge, revenge(-ing), {vengeance}.

vengeance 1349 # dike {dee'-kay}; probably from 1166; right (as self-evident), i.e. justice (the principle, a decision, or its execution): -- judgment, punish, {vengeance}.

vengeance 3709 # orge {or-gay'}; from 3713; properly, desire (as a reaching forth or excitement of the mind), i.e. (by analogy,) violent passion (ire, or [justifiable] abhorrence); by implication punishment: -- anger, indignation, {vengeance}, wrath.

venison 6718 ## tsayid {tsah'-yid}; from a form of 6679 and meaning the same; the chase; also game (thus taken); (generally) lunch (especially for a journey): -- X catcheth, food, X hunter, (that which he took in) hunting, {venison}, victuals.

venison 6720 ## tseydah {tsay-daw'}; or tsedah {tsay-daw'}; feminine of 6718; food: -- meat, provision, {venison}, victuals.

venom 7219 ## ro>sh {roshe}; or rowsh (Deut. 32:32) {roshe}; apparently the same as 7218; a poisonous plant, probably the poppy (from its conspicuous head); generally poison (even of serpents): -- gall, hemlock, poison, {venom}.

venomous 2342 # therion {thay-ree'-on}; diminutive from the same as 2339; a dangerous animal: -- ({venomous}, wild) beast.
