Compare 5180 + smote + beating + to beat + and beat + to smite + and wound + but smote + and smote + shall smite + And they smote + him they struck + by him to smite + me to be smitten + And unto him that smiteth +/.

4475 + by struck + with the palm + and they smote + him with the palms + him with their hands +/. rhapsima {hrap'-is-mah}; from 4474 + smote + shall smite + him with the palms +/; a slap: --(+ strike with the) palm of the hand, smite with the hand .

4476 + a needle s + of a needle +/. rhapsis {hraf-ecce'}; from a primary rhapto (to sew; perhaps rather akin to the base of 4474 + smote + shall smite + him with the palms +/ through the idea of puncturing); a needle: --needle .

5403 + Phenice + as Phenice + unto Phoenicia +/. Phoinike {foy-nee'-kay}; from 5404 + of palm + and palms +/; palm-country; Phoenice (or Phoenicia), a region of Palestine: --Phenice, Phoenicia .

5404 + of palm + and palms +/. phoinix {foy'-nix}; of uncertain derivation; a palm-tree: --palm (tree) .

5405 + to Phenice +/. Phoinix {foy'-nix}; probably the same as 5404 + of palm + and palms +/; Phoenix, a place in Crete: --Phenice .

5563 + put + asunder + departed +/. psalms {psal-mos'}; from 5567 + melody + psalms + and sing + and making + I will sing + let him sing + and I will sing +/; a set piece of music, i.e. a sacred ode (accompanied with the voice, harp or other instrument; a "psalm"); collectively, the book of the Psalms: --psalm . Compare 5603 + song + songs + the song + that song + and the song +/ .

5567 + melody + psalms + and sing + and making + I will sing + let him sing + and I will sing +/. psallo {psal'-lo}; probably strengthened from psao (to rub or touch the surface; compare 5597 + rubbing +/); to twitch or twang, i.e. to play on a stringed instrument (celebrate the divine worship with music and accompanying odes): --make melody, sing (psalms) .

5584 + have handled + they might feel + that might be touched + that it is I myself handle +/. pselaphao {psay-laf-ah'-o}; from the base of 5567 + melody + psalms + and sing + and making + I will sing + let him sing + and I will sing +/ (compare 5586 + stone + my voice + and in the stone +/); to manipulate, i.e. verify by contact; figuratively, to search for: --feel after, handle, touch .

5589 + crumbs + of the crumbs + with the crumbs +/. psichion {psikh-ee'-on}; diminutive from a derivative of the base of 5567 + melody + psalms + and sing + and making + I will sing + let him sing + and I will sing +/ (meaning a crumb); a little bit or morsel: --crumb .

5597 + rubbing +/. psocho {pso'-kho}; prolongation from the same base as 5567 + melody + psalms + and sing + and making + I will sing + let him sing + and I will sing +/; to triturate, i.e. (by analogy) to rub out (kernels from husks with the fingers or hand): --rub .
